What an Amazing Year It's Been

Let's quickly review the happenings and remember you can find more detail on our website newsletters.

- **Record Year:** 2025 was the busiest year for the Trust since its founding in 2016! It's sure been busy!
- Promotion & Outreach:
 - Numerous guest speaking events and workshops held in Tauranga and Bee Valley Flower Farm for the Taranaki Garden Festival.
 - Engagement with a wide range of community groups, including garden clubs, retirement homes, environmental clubs and schools.



Educational Support:

- Over 200 copies of 'Bumblebees Have Smelly Feet' book and 30 live hives donated to schools across New Zealand via the Garden to Table Programme.
- Best Start Childcare purchased 2,000 Bumblebee Books and tote bags for new entrants.
- Website membership and merchandise sales have grown.

• Educational Achievements:

- Developed a national Bumblebee Identification chart and a Bumblebee Discovery field trail.
- Introduced a holiday activity pack for schoolchildren, with trials and feedback underway for a national rollout in 2026.

Special Projects:

- Launched the Tekapo School and community project to save the Short-haired Bumblebee, described as a project of international significance ("To Catch a Queen").
- This project is expected to have major implications for the Trust's future educational work.

To Catch a Queen Project Update

This project is progressing well. Our aim is to study and support our rare species, the short haired bumblebee - Bombus subterraneus. Learn more about our goals on our website <u>To Catch a Queen</u>

Recently, Geoff and Liz from the Bumblebee Trust, together with our new Science Advisor Nelson Pomeroy, NZ's own Bugman Ruud Kleinpaste and Otago University PhD student Connal Mclean, re-visited Tekapo School in the Mackenzie Basin. Activities showcased the fascinating world of bumblebees and their pollinator friends and set the stage for further hands-on learning.

In mid-December, Nelson and Connal will return to Tekapo School to help students capture and observe different species of queen bumblebees. The team will demonstrate the differences between worker and queen bumblebees, and guide students in identifying local flowers, understanding pollen and nectar collection, and observing the progression from bud to flower to seed head.

As part of the project, Nelson will install semi-underground field hives, hoping they will attract Bombus subterraneus queens. If successful, students may have the opportunity to observe a colony when school resumes. Additionally, Nelson plans to attempt captive rearing of subterraneus queens to further our research. Other schools will also become involved in 2026.

HELP - I found a Bumblebee Nest!

We are often contacted if someone finds a nest that is in the wrong place.

First, the Bumblebee Trust does not offer nest relocation services. Generally, we do not advise that people move nests unless it is absolutely necessary.

If immediate relocation is necessary, you may move the nest at night using a red torchlight (or a white light covered with red cellophane) to keep the bees calm. Carefully transfer the nest into a 3- 5-litre planter pot with adequate drainage holes, cover it, and place it upside down under a tree with the holes exposed.
